

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

THE MINIATURIST tells the story of a wealthy, dysfunctional family living in Amsterdam in 1686 during the decline of the Dutch Golden Age.

When the merchant Johannes Brandt commissions a miniature version of his wife's new marital home to be built, its construction under the influence of the elusive miniaturist unleashes long-suppressed secrets, lost love, old wounds and hidden hopes. Each of the inhabitants are forced to look into their souls and one another's hearts and decide whether they have the strength to carry on in a society which might end up condemning them all. Set against the backdrop of the Calvinist church, the gossip of guilds and the overblown trading of the Dutch East India Company, it explores the tyranny and safety of home and the need for secrets and imagination, all linked by a mysterious miniaturist existing on the edge of their lives. As the outside world encroaches further on their private lives, is the miniaturist the elusive key to their salvation? Or is she the architect of their downfalls?

In the tradition of Sarah Dunant, Tracy Chevalier and Emma Donohue yet with a highly original edge, this is an evocative, thought-provoking novel.

Jessie Burton was born in south London in 1982. She studied at Oxford University and The Central School of Speech and Drama. She has appeared in several productions at the National, Bristol Old Vic, Salisbury Playhouse and the Donmar among others, interspersing these with PA roles in the City. In 2011, she was selected out of 150 submissions for the inaugural Curtis Brown Creative Writing course. She lives with her partner, Pip Carter, in East Dulwich. 
MY 500 BEST FRIENDS / MEINE 500 BESTEN FREUNDE Johanna Adorján Luchterhand, February 2013 Literary Fiction

A harmless everyday scene: two women — they would call themselves good friends — meet for a meal and a good chat about this and that. But we are in a not unknown restaurant in the middle of Berlin, and so this is not a harmless scene but a struggle for prestige, poise, and affairs and knowing all about them.

Adorján throws us into the centre of a world in which it is not possible to choose your many friends. We watch an intern artfully planning her career. We gaze in amazement at the – futile – efforts of a publisher's editor who doesn't know what to do with the latest manuscript of a celebrity author. And we are flabbergasted when a has-been soap actor, whose psy-chological demise we have just witnessed, appears again a little while later in the limelight of some exclusive event.

Adorján takes a ruthlessly precise, comical and affectionate look at her heroines and heroes, and the scenes she has painted are a chronic of life, love and suffering in the first ten years of the new millennium.

Johanna Adorján, born in 1971 in Stockholm, studied theater and opera directing. Since 2001 she has been an editor of the culture section of the Frankfurter All-gemeine Sonntagszeitung. She has written theater pieces, as well as a screenplay that has been filmed by Ed Herzog. Her first book, An Exclusive Love, is a big success and has been translated into 16 languages.

As a successful television presenter, she is often booked for marketing events. This time they want her for a whole month for the presentation of a luxury sports car. She agrees to do the job. Thus begins her fall


THE VILLAGE OF MURDERERS /DAS DORF DER MÖRDER Elisabeth Herrmann Goldmann, February 2013 Thriller



Jackson has a M.F.A from New York University and has received the Hurston Wright Award for college fiction writing, a grant from the Urban Artist Initiative, and a fellowship from the Center For Fiction in New York. 
THE GIRL IN THE ROAD Monica Byrne Crown, 2014 Literary Science Fiction

THE GIRL IN THE ROAD is set at two different times in the near future, with alternating narrative threads. In 2068, India has become the dominant political power in the world. New energy technologies have been developed, but it's too late to prevent the seas from rising and changing the planet's coastal geography. Meena, a young Indian woman who is wounded and fleeing from a traumatic event she can't remember, decides to escape by walking the Trail, a

floating energy-harvesting pontoon bridge that spans the entire Arabian Sea from Mumbai to Djibouti on the east coast of Africa. It's forbidden to walk on the Trail, but a shadowy underground subculture has emerged, the Walkers. Part of Meena's goal is to learn what happened to her parents, who were murdered in Ethiopia, at a time of anti-Indian hostility many years ago. She swims out to the Trail's first plate, hoists herself up, and begins her journey to Africa, one wobbly step at a time. Forty years earlier, in 2026, a slave girl named Mariama flees her home in Mauritania after witnessing the rape of her mother. She finds refuge in a truck caravan headed across the Sahara, which is carrying a mysterious cargo. Mariama, in her sections of the book, addresses her story to the person she calls Yemaya, a young woman who joins the caravan in Dakar and takes Mariama under her wing. Increasingly Mariama becomes obsessed with Yemaya, seeing her as a goddess, as they journey across Africa, through Niger, Chad, and Sudan, towards Ethiopia. But when they finally arrive in Addis Ababa, Yemaya disappears. Mariama never recovers from this abandonment, but keeps Yemaya in her heart as a shard, even as she grows up, goes to university, takes part in growing anti-Indian protests, and falls in love with a young Indian doctor. The two stories alternate, with Meena travelling west, and Mariama travelling east, each on a line to the coast of Africa. But it is only at the end, in a stunning climax, that we understand how closely the two stories parallel each other, and how Meena and Mariama are linked.

Monica Byrne studied fiction with Neil Gaiman, Nalo Hopkinson, Kelly Link and Geoff Ryman at the Clarion Workshop. She has published fiction in Gargoyle, Shimmer, Fantasy Magazine and Electric Velocipede, and nonfiction in Wellesley Magazine and HowlRound.

THE GARDENER'S SON Cormac McCarthy Ecco, September 2013 Screenplay reissue

In the spring of 1975 the film director Richard Pearce approached Cormac McCarthy with the idea of writing a screenplay. Using a few photographs in the footnotes to a 1928 biography of a famous pre-Civil War industrialist as inspiration, McCarthy and Pearce roamed the mill towns of the South researching their subject. One year later McCarthy finished "The Gardener's

Son," a riveting drama of impotence, rage, and ultimately violence. Produced as a two-hour film and broadcast on PBS in 1976, "The Gardener's Son" received two Emmy Award nominations and was shown at the Berlin and Edinburgh Film Festivals. "The Gardener's Son" is the tale of two families: the Greggs, a wealthy family that owns and operates the local cotton mill, and the McEvoys, a family of mill workers beset by misfortune. The action opens as Robert McEvoy, a young mill worker, is having his leg amputated -- the limb mangled in an accident rumored to have been caused by James Gregg, son of the mill's founder. McEvoy, crippled and isolated, grows into a man consumed by bitterness and anger; he deserts both his job and his family. Returning two years later at the news of his mother's terminal illness, Robert McEvoy arrives only to confront the grave diggers preparing her final resting place. His father, the mill's gardener, is now working on the factory line, the gardens forgotten. These proceedings stoke the slow burning rage McEvoy carries within him, a fury that ultimately consumes both the McEvoys and the Greggs.

Cormac McCarthy is the author of a number of novels, including BLOOD MERIDIAN, NO COUNTRY FOR OLD MEN, and THE ROAD. His novels have won the National Book Award, The National Books Critics Circle Award, and The Pulitzer Prize. His plays include The Stonemason, and The Sunset Limited, originally performed by Steppenwolf Theatre Company of Chicago. His screenplay, "The Counselor," was made into a film directed by Ridley Scott, and will be released in late 2013.






THE BALLAD OF BARNABAS PIERKIEL, part picaresque parody, part bawdy folk tale, is a wickedly funny, yet ominous tale set in an imaginary Slavic village in 1939. Set in

the quaint (although admittedly backward) imagined nation of Scalvusia in 1939, *The* Ballad of Barnabas Pierkiel is a parody of the classic picaresque novel and a comic love story for the ages. The novel stars —our hero, Barnabas Pierkiel, a young swineherd with romantic delusions of grandeur. Desperate to attract the voluptuous Roosha, a gypsy who has also caught the eye of the town's most eligible bachelor, Barnabas and his trusty steed Wilhelm get embroiled in a series of scandals and misadventures, as every attempt at wooing ends in catastrophe. When the parish priest turns up dead and a suspicious stranger shows up to lead the investigation, Barnabas discovers a cruel streak in his beloved hometown. Our reluctant hero must take a stand to defend what he holds dear, or leave the only life he's known behind for good. Zyzak's wonderfully eccentric supporting cast includes a priest haunted by the devil, a teenage gypsy with mysterious powers, a dim-witted vagabond with a goat for a wife, a corrupt obese mayor content to eat his way through life, and a senile old woman set on keeping Barnabas home with the pigs. Although our narrator maintains an ironic distance from these vibrant players, in the end Zyzak's humor and prose delight in the absurdity of the human plight even while she casts a searing light on the strange and sometimes twisted origins of human behavior.

Magdalena Zyzak is a writer, producer and filmmaker. Born in 1983 in Poland, she studied in Switzerland and completed her BA at University of Southern California in Film Production and English Literature. She holds a MFA in Creative Writing from Columbia University. While still at USC, she cowrote and produced the film Redland, an Independent Spirit Award Nominee. She is now producing her second feature film, Orion. She lives in Santa Monica, California.

THE STRINGER is the story of 23-year-old Rebekah Roberts, a recent college graduate who has moved from Missouri to New York partly to become a reporter, and partly to be closer to her mother, who abandoned her as an infant and may be living in Brooklyn. Rebekah's mother was a Hasidic Jew from Williamsburg who became pregnant and married her Christian father during a period of rebellion. She fled the family just weeks after Rebekah was born and neither Rebekah nor her father has heard from her since. The novel begins whe Rebekah, a newspaper 'stringer' (or freelance journalist) is called to cover a dead body, found dumped and naked in a scrap pile along the Gowanus canal. The dead woman is Hasidic, and Rebekah is shocked to learn that, because of the NYPD's habit of kowtowing to the powerful ultra-orthodox community, not only will she will be buried without an autopsy, her killer may get away with murder. Rebekah finds herself drawn into the mystery of how this woman died, and teams with Saul Katz, an NYPD captain and orthodox Jew. Through Saul, she learns about the cloistered, cryptic world her mother grew up in – but Saul has secrets of his own, secrets that put Rebekah directly in the path of the killer.

Julia Dahl is a journalist specializing in crime and criminal justice who spent three years as a stringer on the city desk at the New York Post, and now works as an associate producer for CBS's 48 Hours Mystery and writes about crime for CBS News.com.







Connie Farrington, a 17year-old shop assistant at Cleat's Corner Store, sees in the Onorati brothers a window to the world beyond the petty confines of rural English life. But the Onorati boys are discovering an England very different from the one promised to them by their domineering father, Aldo. Once the Fascist Commissioner of Montelupini, Aldo seems unable to allow himself to rise beyond the prisoner-of-war status he once held on the farm where he has returned with his sons to escape the depression in Italy. The charismatic Vittorio embraces all things English, determined to reinvent himself, but the more sensitive Lucio is haunted by the secrets of the past, by events that tether him to Italy, so that he can only see what he once was and not what he might become. This cross-cultural love story is set in a period of intense social change both in Italy and England, and explores love, prejudice, and identity in the aftermath of the Second World War. For one family, surviving is only the beginning. JoANNE Riccioni was born in the UK to an Italian father and English mother. She worked in Singapore and Paris before settling in Sydney. She has a master's in literature from Leeds University. Her short stories have been read on the BBC and Radio National, and published in The Best Australian Stories 2010 and 2011. Her story, 'Can't Take the Country out of the Boy', has been optioned for a short film.

PANIC IN A SUITCASE Yelena Akthiorskaya Riverhead, Spring 2014 General Fiction

When the Nasmertov family moved from Soviet Odessa to New York City, they left behind discrimination, genteel poverty, a lack of opportunity, and uncle Pasha, a burgeoning poet. A neurotic, an isolationist, and (to the family's great dismay) a recently converted Christian, Pasha stages a quiet rebellion by stalling

on his promise to join the family in the Russian-Jewish enclave of Brighton Beach, Brooklyn: he can't, or won't, shake the psychic handcuffs that keep him from a decision. For better or worse, Pasha gets to remain what he is—a Russian poet. Crouched in the kitchen, crashed in front of the incomprehensible television, riveted, confounded: the Nasmertovs are at once Soviet Jews and Americans, stuck somewhere between worlds, shambling along the border, packed like dizzy sardines. But if the Nasmertov parents can only afford to look forward, learning the rules of aspiration, the family's youngest, Frida, on her rickety way towards adulthood, can only look back. Her voice and deeply embedded perspective turn the novel into a counter-history—a novel of what might have been, a portrait of nearly twenty years of halted progress.

PANIC IN A SUITCASE is a piece of art that so deeply inhabits the experience of a particularly Russian journey while foregoing the comforting clichés. In rich, lyrical prose, Yelena Akhtiorskaya explores the shifting perspectives on what it means to be in the US, forever new and unsettled. The language is peerlessly inventive and a stylistic precedent is difficult to locate.

Yelena Akthiorskaya was born in Odessa, raised in Brighton, educated at Hunter and then at the Columbia MFA program. Her work has appeared in n+1, where portions of PANIC IN A SUITCASE were featured, The New Republic, and Tablet, among others.

Stuck waist-deep in the nutrient-rich mud of his flooded field, Jay Mize discovers a dead body. Were Jay in his right mind, he might have reported the body to the police who are, at that very moment, searching for a missing tourist from Ohio. He

might not have dragged it back to his farm under the cover of night, might not have gotten his hands dirty, but Jay is not in his right mind. He hasn't been for some time. SOIL is a story about psychic tectonics and about the gravitational pull of one man's apocalypse. It's about a young, struggling farmer with an estranged wife and son, a ruined crop, bully neighbors, and a simple, decaying dream: to farm his small patch of rural Mississippi soil in the most responsible and renewable way possible. Disgraced, insolvent, quite possibly cuckolded, Jay tends the flooded breadth of his untenable ground, sinking ever deeper into a paranoid obsession as the stakes of his decisions grow unchecked around him. SOIL borrows selectively and smartly from various genre conventions while stirring up all kinds of majestically gnarly local atmospherics. We are in 'cross-over' territory with a pacing and perspectival alternation that keeps us perpetually on the hook. And the ending—well, that'll do you in.

Jamie Kornegay lives in the Mississippi Delta, where he moved in 2006 to establish an independent bookstore, Turnrow Book Co. Prior to the opening of his bookstore, Kornegay was a bookseller, events coordinator, and radio show producer at the renowned Square Books in Oxford, Mississippi. Kornegay studied creative fiction under Barry Hannah at the University of Mississippi. SOIL is his first novel.

APPROACHING THE SPEED OF LIGHT is a story of tragedy and triumph, fragility and strength. THE RITZ AT WAR Tilar Mazzeo Harper, March 2014 History

Since the end of the nineteenth century, the Ritz Hotel on the spacious Place Vendôme in the city's first arrondissement had been an international symbol of luxury and glamour. When France fell to the Germans in June of 1940, the propaganda maestro of the Third Reich, Joseph Goebbels, famously declared that the capital would be gay and happy-or else. Orders from Berlin were to divide the Hôtel Ritz into two sections: one half of the hotel was home to the highest-ranking German officers; the other half was home to the rich and famous civilians (and to the spies among them) who stayed on in Paris during the Nazi period. There was Reichsmarshal Hermann Göring: the morphine-addicted and flamboyantly excessive German Air Force general, who spent much of the war at the Hôtel Ritz pillaging art, running the Nazi war-machine, and desperately trying to avoid the brutal rages of Adolph Hitler, who blamed his second-in-command for failing to secure world domination. At Coco Chanel's table in the Hôtel Ritz dining room on any given evening, one might find the playwright and screenwriter Sacha Guitry, the lithe Russian ballet-star Serge Lifar, or the drug-addled Jean Cocteau. In the same dining room, Georges Mandel's mistress, the Rubenesque comic actress Béatrice Bretty, might be found sharing cocktails and good times with France's most acclaimed film star known simply as Arletty. Then there was the Lost Generation--F. Scott Fitzgerald, for whom the Hôtel Ritz bar was a favorite watering hole, and Ernest Hemingway, who later along with his rogue band of "irregulars" liberated the Hôtel Ritz, and many bottles of vintage wine from its cellars, in the last hours of the occupation. By the spring of 1944, as the war drew to an agonizing close, those who had passed the war in opulence at the palace hotel were, at long last, coming to terms with the consequence of luxury and celebrity. Some entered last-minute crises of conscience that would lead them to confront the inhumanity of their own actions and inactions. 

The 14th Century Asian despot and Middle Ages conqueror was buried in a sarcophagus covered by the world's largest single piece of jade. The legend said that if the cover would be disturbed, the greatest conflict would be unleashed on the world. In THE FURIES UNLEASHED: The Soviet People at War, 1941-1945,

historian Steven Merritt Miner attempts to do no less than recontextualize the details and impact of the Soviet-German War. In this comprehensive examination, Professor

Miner will recast the military, diplomatic, and social history of the USSR during the war in a way never before presented. Making use of collections of previously top-secret documents released in post-Soviet Russia—and consulting a mass of new memoirs published after the collapse of the USSR—Miner will assemble an updated narrative of this monumental clash, taking into account tangled ethnic, national, and regional realities, while blending the cultural, social, and economic factors that both devastated and made possible the bloody triumph of the Russian people. No English language book has done this before.

Steven M. Miner, Professor of History and Director of the Contemporary History Institute, is a specialist in recent Russian/Soviet and East European history. His first book, Between Churchill and Stalin: The Soviet Union, Great Britain, and the Origins of the Grand Alliance (1988) won the American Historical Association's 1991 George Louis Beer prize for the Best Book of the Year in European history. He is also the author of Stalin 's 'Holy Wa r': Religi on, Nati onalism ,and Alliance Politics , 1941-1945 (2003).



I KISS YOUR HANDS MANY TIMES - HEARTS, SOULS, AND WARS IN HUNGARY Marianne Szegedy-Maszák Spiegel & Grau, August 2013

Pre-war 1940s Budapest was a dynamic backdrop for young romance—commerce-driven, saturated with cultural diversity, and holding a deep appreciation for the arts, the city flourished. Yet for Aladár, a rising star in the foreign ministry and a vocal advocate against fascism, and Hanna, the granddaughter of Manfred Weiss, a


prominent industrialist patriarch of an aristocratic Jewish family, the onset of World War II forced their love to wait. The story of Aladár and Hanna is a true account of Marianne Szegedy-Maszák's parents during one of the most devastating times in history. Upon German invasion in March 1944, the Weiss family was forced into hiding. In a secret and controversial deal brokered with Heinrich Himmler, the family turned over their vast holdings in exchange for a safe passage to Portugal. Aladár, sent

to Dachau under arrest after talks with the Allies, was released from his imprisonment as an empty shell of himself. After nearly two years without any contact, Aladár wrote Hanna a letter, in which he warned her of his change. This would not hinder their love: in December 1945, the couple was at last wed in a devastated Budapest. I KISS YOUR HANDS MANY TIMES explains the complicated relationship that Hungary had with its Jewish population—the moments of magnificent humanism that stood apart from its history of anti-Semitism—and with

the rest of the world. At once intimate and epic, it is also a story of a daughter's attempt to extract the essence, strength, and beauty of her parents, and to resurrect a lost world of splendor.

Marianne Szegedy-Maszák's journalism career has spanned over twenty-five years and has included covering the collapse of communism, 9/11, neuroscience, and social policy for such publications as The New York Times Magazine, Esquire, Harper's Bazaar, the Los Angeles Times, The New Republic, Newsweek, among others.




