an evening in the grand style that he will never forget.

But Élodie has not counted on what Lawrence might teach her in return, or how much their

unlikely encounter will mark them both. Sebastian Hampson's *The Train to Paris* is an

unexpected, compulsively readable love story.

Sebastian Hampson was born in 1992 in Auckland, New Zealand. He grew up in

Wellington and was educated at Scots College. He has spent time living in Europe and

currently resides in Wellington, New Zealand, where he is a student of art history and

Tree Palace by Craig Sherborne

They tried Mansfield but it was freezing and snowed and people like them don't fit in because they don't look prosperous. One time near Yellingbo they found a church no one prayed in and they lived there and for three weeks had stained glass for windows. It was the perfect church Shane was looking for for work. They got chased out and went to Shepparton but Shane had a run-in and police said move.

Shane, Moira and Midge, along with young Rory and Zara, are 'trants'—itinerants wandering the plains of western Victoria in search of disused houses to sleep in, or to strip of valuable heritage fittings when funds are low.

When they find their Tree Palace outside the town of Barleyville, things are looking up. Finally, a place in which to settle down.

But Zara, fifteen, is pregnant and doesn't want to look after the child. She'd rather have a normal life, not trant life with a baby. Moira decides to step in: as the boy's grandmother, she can nurse him.

Then, after a job at an empty mansion, Shane finds himself in serious trouble with the local police...

Tree Palace is a moving story of family and rural life, enlivened by a sharp wit. Warmly told and evocative, Craig Sherborne's second novel is a revelation.

Craig Sherborne's debut book of fiction, *The Amateur Science of Love* won the Best Writing Prize in the 2012 Melbourne Prize for Literature and was shortlisted for the NSW and Victoria Premiers' Awards. His 2005 memoir, *Hoi Polloi*, was shortlisted for both the Queensland and Victorian Premiers' Literary Awards. The follow-up, *Muck*, won the Queensland Premier's Literary Award for Non-Fiction in 2008. Sherborne is a former Wal Cherry Play of the Year award-winner. He has also written two volumes of poetry and a verse-drama called *Look at Everything Twice for Me*. Sherborne's journalism and poetry have appeared in most of Australia's leading literary journals and anthologies.

The Lost Child by Suzanne McCourt

I hide in the leaves of the kurrajong tree. I hide in my reading and writing and sums. I hide in my Sunday-school singing and Mrs Bullfrog's big bosom breathing the hymns, that same secret bosom I've seen at the lake without her pink-strapped brassiere. I hide in the stillness that flattens the sea before the storm comes, in the cloud of black ducks that spreads like an inkblot across the white sky. I hide in Miss Taylor's kind eyes. I hide.

Sylvie is five. It's the 1950s and she lives in Burley Point, a fishing village south of the Coorong on Australia's wild southern coast. She worships her older brother Dunc even though he excludes her from his adventures. She tries to make sense of her brooding mother, and her moody father who ignores her and then abandons the family for The Trollop, Layle Lewis, across the lagoon.

It's hard to keep secrets in a small town, but when Dunc goes missing, Sylvie is terrified that she is the cause. Now her father is angry all the time; her mother won't leave the house or stop cleaning. The bush and the birds and the endless beach are Sylvie's only salvation, apart from her teacher, Miss Taylor.

In the tradition of the novels of Anne Tyler and Eudora Welty, Suzanne McCourt's *The Lost Child* is a beautifully written story about family, identity and growing up. Sylvie is a charming narrator with a big heart and a sharp eye for the comic moment. As the years go by she learns how tiny events can change entire lives, how loved ones can desert you, and how leaving might be the only solution when you're a smart young woman and the world as you know it has been changed forever.

After a career in teaching, marketing, public relations and private employment, **Suzanne McCourt** is now a full-time writer. She lives in Melbourne with her family, and she is the Publisher at Posh Dog Publishing, which publishes photo-based gift books. *The Lost Child* is her first novel.

It's the full ridiculous.

In the end Don finds the solution but not before he learns that emotional support is as important as

practical expertise.

And Rosie realises she can rely on him.

Don and Rosie's son is delivered happily into the world.
