
historian and journalist, is the head of the Medienagentur Geschichte (History Media Agency) in Hamburg. He writes for the print media and radio and supervises the organisation of research projects and history exhibitions.

With his book historian Tillmann Bendikowski has devoted himself to the topic of religious schism, published at a time when, with the German Pope and his even more popular successor, religion seems to become popular again. In the face of Islamic threats, another re-emergence from the depths of our dark past seems to be that of the idea of being different or even an infidel. This is because there is the trail of a veritable religious war winding its way through our past.

This is the focus of Tillmann Bendikowski's book: it first goes into the origin of the conflict and then follows its course through the Thirty Years' War, on to the Enlightenment and right down to the present day.

Ulrich Drüner, born in France in 1943, studied music and musicology and wrote his PhD dissertation on Richard Wagner. He played the viola in the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra and the orchestra of the Stuttgart State Opera, where he played in numerous high-level Wagner performances. Ulrich Drüner has been involved in several radio and television programmes about Richard Wagner, and has written a number of books.


Although celebrating successes with *Rienzi* and *Lohengrin*, Richard Wagner had to write begging letters and look for patrons, partly because of his addiction to luxury and partly because in the early 19th century serious composers were paid worse than spectacular virtuosos.

Yet Wagner managed to create a myth around himself and his work, opening new financial – and artistic – possibilities. One aspect of this self-staging was reciting and declaiming his poetry to small circles of friends, and this helped him find the speech melody and inspiration for his texts.

Here we have a biography that shows how Wagner was not only a pioneer as a composer, director and conductor, but also had a considerable influence on the image of intellectuals in Germany.

Erich Follath, born in 1949, is a political scientist and well-known non-fiction author. As the diplomatic correspondent of the Spiegel, he traveled to the Middle East, the Indian subcontinent, and East Asia several times each year. He has been observing the history and development of these regions for decades and has written numerous reports about their rise.

He is regarded as the "Marco Polo of the Orient": in the 14th century Ibn Battuta travelled through wide parts of the then known world, his path taking him from Morocco to Mecca and then on to Constantinople and Crimea and as far as Samarkand, India, Indonesia and China. In the accounts of his travels, the "King of all Travellers" describes Islam as a religion of progress and tolerance and as a bond uniting the countries he passes through.

700 years later, Erich Follath follows in the footsteps of Ibn Battuta, going through an Islamic world that has fundamentally changed. In twelve places important to Ibn Battuta, Follath impressively shows where the Islam world stands today, the problems it is struggling with and the challenges it is facing.

His book is a search for traces of one of the most enigmatic personalities of the Middle Ages, an investigation that both explains ancient sites and present-day political trouble spots and at the same time gives readers fascinating glimpses of the past and present in the world of Islam.



Oliver Hilmes, born in 1971, studied history, politics and psychology in Marburg, Paris and Potsdam. His biographies of Alma Mahler-Werfel and Cosima Wagner were bestsellers. In summer 1936 the Olympic Games hold Berlin completely in their sway. Tens of thousands of people surge through the German capital city, which the National Socialists are keen to present to the world in these sixteen days as a cosmopolitan metropolis. Oliver Hilmes follows in the tracks of famous and completely unknown people, guests from Germany and abroad, through the feverishly shimmering time of the summer games. He skilfully links the events of these days to create a panorama of a dictatorship in suspension.



Brigitte Roßbeck, born in 1944, is a historian, freelance journalist and radio editor. She has been writing biographies for many years and is a member of PEN International.


Maria Marc, born in Berlin in 1876, was a painter, tapestry weaver and Franz Marc's second wife. After Franz Marc's death in Verdun in 1916, she devoted herself to the administration of his estate and works and embarked on a second artistic career as a Bauhaus weaver in Weimar. She died in 1955.

In 1905, the painter Maria Franck met her colleague, Franz Marc. By 1913 they were married. Maria Marc's records put the spotlight on her husband and artist Franz Marc. She keeps quiet neither about his periods of melancholy nor about the self-doubts driving him to destroy many of his early works. She poignantly but amusingly and with many anecdotes reports on all matters concerning love and marriage, including her own despair. She tells of periods of optimism and important friendships on the way to the exciting Blauer Reiter epoch, and goes into how she experienced the war years and her widowhood.

The editor of this volume, Brigitte Roßbeck, bought the handwritten memoires of Maria Marc in an auction and has made these documents of great personal and artistic power accessible to the public for the first time.


Martin Mittelmeier, born in 1971, is seen as one of the most prominent publishing editors for contemporary literature in Germany. The PhD comparatist has published several works on philology and philosophy.

In February 1916, in the middle of war, a small group of artists, writers and theatre people founded the Cabaret Voltaire in neutral Zürich. From here, something incredible happened – DADA was born and spread out from Zürich to infect the entire world. The character of DADA changed in every place, for the Dadaists were determined about one aspect: DADA was not to become a new programme. That is why DADA, after the readymades of Duchamp, the montages of Grosz and Heartfield and the André Breton scandals in Paris was quickly over. But it continues to have an effect even today.

Martin Mittelmeier strolls along and shares our amazement, involves us in the many DADA subversions and demonstrates how skilfully, desperately and absurdly the Dadaists reacted to the problems of an increasingly complex world.

Dietmar Pieper, born in 1963, studied literature and has been working for the Spiegel since 1989. Between 2001 and 2008 he was one of the heads of the German Politics department, and since then he has been the editor responsible for the Spiegel History and the Spiegel Knowledge series.

Johannes Saltzwedel, born in 1962, has been a *Spiegel* editor since 1991, where he is mainly involved in the history of culture and philosophy, non-fiction literature and classical music. Among his published works are several studies of Johann Wolfgang Goethe and Rudolf Borchardt.

Their legions conquered a world empire; their language formed the basis of European education. Neither bitter conflicts of the orders within nor a long series of strong war opponents from without could topple the existence of their imperium. But who were the Romans? How was a small peasant state able to become a major empire on the Mediterranean?

Historians and *Spiegel* journalists have traced the turbulent path of a by no means coherent state from its legendary foundation to the assassination of Caesar. Many other aspects of the Roman republic are also examined: table manners and favoured cuisine, the emergence of Latin as a language, national poetry following the Greek example and the amazing durability of Roman concrete.


Ana Lilia Perez, born in Mexico City in 1976, is an investigative journalist and writes about how the Mexican mafia has infiltrated the state and economy there, making everyday life miserable for the population. Perez studied history and journalism and worked as a reporter for renowned daily newspapers. She caused a stir with El Cartel Negro, a book about the stateowned petroleum company Pemex and its entanglement with the cartels and found herself in the focus of mafia attention. Her work has been awarded many prizes, among them the Premio Nacional de Periodisimo.

Hamburg is the main terminal for the distribution to Northern and Eastern Europe, Germany is one of the top consumer countries. Police or state control? Forget it – the authorities are powerless against the Mexican cartels, whose drug network has long since encompassed all five continents.

Reporter Ana Lilia Perez traces the paths taken by cocaine on its way to Germany; she once again writes about the criminal system, even if in the process she finds herself fearing for her life.

As a well-known air travel journalist he is also in demand as an expert on aviation matters on radio and television.

March 8, 2014: flight MH 370 disappears. March 24, 2015: Germanwings 9525 crashes. Why do hundreds of people keep on dying in air crashes?

Andreas Spaeth, Germany's most popular aviation journalist, probes the causes of the most spectacular crashes in recent years, and his diagnosis is alarming. Pilots might not be properly trained, or air traffic controllers might not be able to cope, or collision warning equipment could fail, or a sudden drop in air pressure is also possible – no matter, in spite of all technical progress, an air crash can never be ruled out.

Maria von Welser is a television journalist, newspaper commentator and successful book author with many awards to her name. She became known as the editor and presenter of the women's television journal ML – Mona Lisa, which for ten years she was responsible for. Welser is on the board of governors of the University of Hamburg and, since 2008, vicepresident of UNICEF Germany.

Hundreds of people in rubber dinghies, long human caravans, hopelessly overcrowded trains: hardly a day goes by without new pictures of refugees. What is striking is the fact that most of the people in these pictures are men. Where have the women and children got to who are also fleeing in their millions from places like the Middle East? Few of them make it to Europe but instead remain behind in such countries as Jordan or Lebanon.

Maria von Welser has travelled through crisis regions and accompanied fleeing women. She describes what women go through, tells of sexual harassment, temporary marriages and child brides. A harrowing report.

Orna Donath, born in 1976, is a sociologist at the Ben Gurion University of the Negev in Beersheba, where she carries out research on the social expectations particularly faced by women. After her study Making a Choice, which was published in 2011 and examined Jewish women in Israel who decide against children, Regretting Motherhood is her first international book publication. Beside her academic activities, she is involved in volunteer work at the Hasharon Rape Crisis Center in Raanana, whose chairperson she is.

Motherhood is fulfilling and makes you happy. Saying anything to the contrary means you are egoistic and uncaring or not quite normal. When she published the first results of her study *Regretting Motherhood*, the Israeli sociologist Orna Donath set off a world-wide debate that is still in its early stages.

In her book, she looks at the correlation between the social dictate of motherhood and the hitherto rarely expressed feelings of regret voiced by mothers. "A woman must still be allowed self-determination when she has children", says Orna Donath, thus giving feminism a decisive impulse.

Clemens G. Arvay, born in 1980, graduated in engineering and biology. He studied landscape ecology and applied plant sciences and has authored several books, including a number of bestsellers. Arvay is fascinated by the relationship between human beings and nature, and the focus of his work is on the health-promoting effect of contacts with plants, animals and the countryside.

The human body does not end with the surface of the skin. Clemens G. Arvay sets out to find scientific evidence of healing bonds existing between human beings and nature. In which way do the terpenes in the woods boost our immune system? Which anticancer substances from nature could be used in medication? What role do animals play in that great organism called Earth of which we are also part?

Arvay has written of what he discovered from his own field studies and experiments and also of what he learned from internationally leading scientists. He has thus established the new science of eco-psychosomatics, which has revolutionised our understanding of ourselves and our connection with the environment.

Matthias Eckoldt, born in 1964, is an author, lecturer and radio contributor with multiple awards to his name. He has published novels, essays and nonfiction books.

Without them pollenating the blossoms, things would look bad indeed for the world food supply. But they can do far more: their tiny brains think, plan, count and even dream. Bertram Eisenhauer was born in 1964, grew up in Baden and studied in Heidelberg, Connecticut and New York. He worked as an editor in the culture and politics sections of the FAZ and is now head of the "Life" section of the Frankfurter Allgemeine Sonntagszeitung.

"Bike collapses under fat German man!" The possibility of such a YouTube video watched 1.2 million times is only one of Bertram Eisenhauer's nightmares. He's not fat. He is 6XL fat. And so his resolution to lose weight is not just a banal decision to go on a diet. It is the courageous resolve after decades as a "Fatty" to return to life with the others.

Being fat is much more than simply being overweight. It is a loss of almost everything generally called life. And so losing weight is also more than changing one's eating habits and doing sport. It requires an examination and analysis of one's own past. Eisenhauer candidly gets to the bottom of his long-term obesity and realises that hunger stands for a feeling, for a longing and a pain, and that eating is only a paramedic in an emergency.
