THE GUEST BOOK by Sarah Blake (May 2019)

From the *New York Times* bestselling author of *The Postmistress* comes a novel about past mistakes and betrayals that ripple throughout generations. *The Guest Book* follows three generations of a powerful American family, a family that "used to run the world." And when the novel begins in 1935, they still do. Kitty and Ogden Milton appear to have everything—perfect children, good looks, a love everyone envies. But after a tragedy

befalls them, Ogden tries to bring Kitty back to life by purchasing an island in Maine. That island, and its house, come to define and burnish the Milton family, year after year after year. And it is there that Kitty issues a refusal that will haunt her till the day she dies. In 1959 a young Jewish man, Len Levy, will get a job in Ogden's bank and earn the admiration of Ogden and one of his daughters, but the scorn of everyone else. Len's best friend Reg Pauling has always been the only black man in the room—at Harvard, at work, and finally at the Miltons' island in Maine. An island that, at the dawn of the twenty-first century, this last generation doesn't have the money to keep. When Kitty's granddaughter, Evie, hears that she and her cousins might be forced to sell it, and when Evie's husband brings back disturbing evidence about her grandfather's past, she realizes she is on the verge of finally understanding the silences that seemed to hover just below the surface of her family all her life. An ambitious novel that weaves the American past with its present, *The Guest Book* examines not just a privileged American family, but a privileged America. With an engrossing love story at its core, it is a literary triumph.

The animals have all begun to die. Soon we will be alone here.

Franny Stone has spent her life beside the sea, obsessed with the birds that soar above it, preferring the wildness of currents and waves to anything humans have to offer. But as the world's temperatures rise and wildlife begins to die off in devastating mass extinctions, her beloved birds disappear. Soon, even seagulls are a rare sight, and with funding drying up and the scientific community turning to more dire threats, Franny decides to take matters into her own hands. In remote Greenland, she finds the last flock of Arctic terns, which have the longest migration of any animal, and decides to follow them herself to the end of their route in Antarctica. Franny talks her way onto the *Saghani*, one of the only remaining legal fishing boats in the world, and with the salty, eccentric crew, embarks on a harrowing journey. As the *Saghani* fights its way south, the story of Franny's life unspools: her mother's disappearance, her lonely childhood, her passionate yet complicated marriage, and, finally, the savage loss that has driven her on this final migration. When the voyage turns ugly, fragmenting the crew, Franny fears the wildness within her—the thing she's been running from, yet searching for, all her life—has finally caught up with her. Shatteringly beautiful in its evocation of the natural world, *Migrations* is an ode to the wild places and creatures threatened by climate change. But at its heart, it is a timeless story about the lengths we will go—to the edges of the world and back—for the people we love.

When eleven-year-old Ren's master dies, he makes one last request of his Chinese houseboy: that Ren will find his severed finger, lost years ago in an accident, and reunite it with his body. Ren has forty-nine days, or else his master's soul will roam the earth, unable to rest in peace. Ji Lin has always wanted to be a doctor, but as a young woman in 1930s Malaysia, apprentice dressmaker is a more suitable occupation. Secretly, though, Ji

Lin also moonlights as a dancehall girl to help pay off her mother's Mahjong debts. One night, Ji Lin's dance partner leaves her with a gruesome souvenir: a severed finger. Convinced the finger is bad luck, Ji Lin enlists the help of her erstwhile stepbrother to return it to its rightful owner. As the forty-nine days tick down, and a prowling tiger wreaks havoc on the town, Ji Lin and Ren's lives intertwine in ways they could never have imagined. Propulsive and lushly written, *The Night Tiger* explores colonialism and independence, ancient superstition and modern ambition, sibling rivalry and first love. Braided through with Chinese folklore and a tantalizing mystery, this novel is a page-turner of the highest order.

From IMPAC Dublin Award finalist Angie Cruz comes a novel inspired by her mother about a teenage girl's arranged marriage and her journey from the Dominican Republic to New York City, set against the tumult of the 1960s. Fifteen-year-old Ana had planned to live an uneventful life in the Dominican countryside. That is until her ambitious mother marries her off to Juan Ruiz, a man twice her age with connections in New York City. Marrying Juan is an opportunity for Ana's entire family to eventually come to the U.S., so she agrees. Leaving her beloved siblings and an innocent romance behind, she is suddenly a wife trapped in a cold, six-story walk-up in Washington Heights, watching the world unfold outside her window while her controlling husband works several jobs to send money back home. Ana hatches a reckless plan to escape, but is stopped by Juan's younger and free-spirited brother Cesar, who convinces her to stay with Juan once he finds out she's pregnant. While Ana bides her time to leave Juan, the Dominican Republic slides further into political turmoil. Juan heads to Santo Domingo to protect his family's assets, leaving Cesar to take care of Ana. Cesar shows her the beauty of the city—Radio City Music Hall, Coney Island, the World's Fair—and Ana sees the possibilities for a new life forming. She takes secret English classes at the church down the street, links arms with protesters, feeds a lonely neighbor...and falls madly in love with the charismatic Cesar. When Juan returns, Ana must decide once again between her heart and her duty to her family.

The author's second novel, *The Immigrant's Handbook*, will follow in Fall 2020—a bawdy, bracing, utterly original novel structured around the twenty most commonly asked job interview questions. The book imagines if a recently laid-off, fifty-six-year-old Dominican American woman actually answered the generic questions truthfully, giving us her full life story as a dramatic monologue.

In Reed King's wildly imaginative and possibly prescient debut, the United States has dissolved in the wake of environmental disasters and the catastrophic policies of its final president. It is 2085, and Truckee Wallace, a factory worker in Crunchtown 407 (formerly Little Rock, Arkansas, before the secessions), has no grand ambitions besides maybe, possibly, losing his virginity someday. But when Truckee is thrust unexpectedly into the spotlight, he is tapped by the President for a sensitive political mission: to deliver a talking goat across the continent. The fate of the world depends upon it. The problem is—Truckee's not sure it's worth it. Joined on the road by an android who wants to be human and a former convict lobotomized in Texas, Truckee will navigate an environmentally depleted and lawless continent with devastating—and hilarious—parallels to our own, dodging body pickers, Elvis-worshippers, logo girls, body subbers, and VR addicts. Elvis-willing, he may even lose his virginity. *FKA USA* is the epic novel we've all been waiting for about the American end of times, with its unavoidable sense of being on the wrong end of the roller coaster ride. It is a masterwork of ambition, humor, and satire with the power to make us cry, despair, and laugh out loud all at once. It is a tour de force unlike anything else you will read this year.








THE MOMENT OF LIFT: How Empowering Women Changes the World by Melinda Gates (April 2019)
