In the tradition of *Sapiens*, bestselling author Susan Wise Bauer's *BONES*, *BLOOD*, *BREATH*: *How Sickness Shapes Our World* is a gripping and thought-provoking take on human history told through humanity's evolving perceptions of illness.

In illness, Bauer provides a surprising new lens through which to consider all of human history—she argues that bodily sickness and our conception of it has shaped our culture, our philosophies, and our religions, and has directly and indirectly affected how we view others, how we view ourselves, and how we fashion our world. She argues that sickness is the great mirror that reflects back our most urgent and eternal questions: Why does calamity descend without warning? How can we explain it? And how do we fight back?

Told in a propulsive narrative style that brings sweeping history to life through intimate individual stories—the feverish Mesopotamian sufferer; the plague victim who dies alone, the last in his village; the seventeenth-century teenager racked by smallpox; the Congolese grandmother watching her family die of Ebola—Bauer takes readers on a journey from humans' earliest days when sickness was an unsolvable mystery, evidence that humans were powerless to the unseen forces of gods, to more modern times and the birth of germ theory, when secularism grew alongside our fear of contamination. Bringing us full circle, Bauer discusses how in our contemporary era, HIV, Ebola, Superbugs, and a number of other seemingly apocalyptic forces have pushed people away from science and back towards the old and perverse comforts of superstition and suspicion of the other.

A multidisciplinary human history like no other, BONES, BLOOD, BREATH is a big think book that tells a large-scale, vivid, chronological story, stretching around the world from ancient times until the present—it will change the way we understand who we are.

Susan Wise Bauer is a writer, historian, and educator. Known for combining meticulous research with gripping detail to offer her readers sweeping and engaging big-picture narratives, Susan is also an in-demand speaker and expert. She is the author of eighteen books, including the educational classic *The Well-Trained Mind* (with Jessie Wise), **250,000+ copies sold**; *The Well-Educated Mind*, **110,000+ copies sold**; the *History of the World* series **300,000+ copies sold**; and *The Story of the World* series **1.5 million+ copies** since 2001. Bauer has a bachelor's degree in English language and linguistics with a minor in Greek; a Master of Divinity in Ancient Near Eastern Languages and Literature; an M.A. in English language and literature; and a Ph.D. in American Studies, with a concentration in the history of American religion. The first history of the iconic Barbizon Hotel, told through the generations of women who passed through its halls

Built in 1927, the Barbizon Hotel in New York was first intended as a home for the Modern Woman seeking a career in the arts,

capitalizing on the post- WWI influx of women flowing into Manhattan looking for jobs. With its grand lobby, swimming pool, sterling press (*The New York Times* commented on its "highly feminine boudoirs" and built-in radio in each room), and Bloomingdales down the street, the hotel offered a safe, glamorous place for parents to send daughters itching to pursue their dreams.

Over the years, its 688 tiny pink rooms housed Joan Crawford, Grace Kelly (notorious for sneaking in men), Joan Didion, Candice Bergen, Ali McGraw, Cybil Shepherd, Elaine Stritch, Liza Minnelli, Eudora Welty, Phylicia Rashad, Ann Beattie, and Mona Simpson, among many others. Sylvia Plath fictionalized her time at The Barbizon in *The Bell Jar*, and *Mademoiselle* magazine boarded its summer interns there, as did the Ford Modeling Agency its young models.

Written in a stylish, assured voice, THE BARBIZON is a colorful portrait of these lives, forming a history of the hotel, of women in the arts in New York City, and of women's emancipation from the Jazz Age to the present.



Game of Shadows meets Shoe Dog in this explosive behind-thescenes look that reveals for the first time the unsettling details of Nike's secret running program—the Nike Oregon Project.

In May 2017, journalist Matt Hart received a USB drive containing a single file—a 4.7-megabyte PDF named "Tic Toc, Tic Toc...." He quickly realized he was in possession of a stolen report prepared a year earlier by the United States Anti-Doping Agency (USADA) for the Texas Medical Board, part of an investigation into legendary running coach Alberto Salazar, a Houston-based endocrinologist named Dr. Jeffrey Brown, and cheating by Nike-sponsored runners, including some of the world's best athletes.

The information Hart received was part of an unfolding story of deception which began when Steve Magness, an assistant to Salazar, broke the omertà—the Mafia-like code of silence about performance-enhancing drugs among those involved—and alerted the USADA. He was soon followed by Olympians Adam and Kara Goucher who risked their careers to become whistleblowers on their former Nike running family in Beaverton, Oregon.


Combining sports drama and business exposé, Win at All Costs tells the full story of Nike's running program, uncovering a corporate win-at-all-costs culture. Hart's book a cautionary tale for America's next generation of athletes, and a wake-up call for sports fans, opening their eyes to the reality that rigged competition is widespread and systemic.

She is the recipient of several honorary degrees, has been elected an honorary fellow of the Geological Society of London, inducted into the National Academy of Sciences in Washington, DC, was a National Geographic Explorer in Residence, served as a

fellow of the African Academy of Sciences, and received the National Geographic Society Hubbard Medal, among many other accolades and achievements. She is also an author of numerous groundbreaking scientific publications in prestigious journals and of several monographs documenting her research.



New York Times bestselling author Mark Synnott's riveting, high-stakes account of the ill-fated Everest summit attempt of strapping, highborn George Mallory and ingenious, tenacious Sandy Irvine, and, a century later, the author's own attempt to solve the enduring mystery of their climb by

summiting Everest himself.

In 1924, a full thirty years before Sir Edmond Hillary's famous climb, before the invention of even the most rudimentary modern climbing technology, two men attempted the impossible – to summit Everest. Both men died on the mountain, and in 1999 Mallory's body was discovered. Irvine has never been found. The book begins when Jessica thought her life would end, in both the physical and emotional sense, when she had a miscarriage home alone at 16 weeks pregnant. Feeling alone and horrified, she texted her husband, parents, friends, anyone she could: "I HAD A MISCARRIAGE" – words that ultimately led her to galvanize her pain for cultural change.

In a straightforward and at times visceral recounting, Jessica talks about returning to work as a therapist, where her pregnant belly had already become a third person in the consultation room, and the effect it had on women who either had experienced similar losses, or feared them. She talks about what she craved from her husband and friends in the aftermath, having a postpartum body and postpartum depression without the baby to show for it, and when and how sex became possible again. And finally, she talks about talking: how the more open we can be, the sooner women can understand miscarriage as a natural part of the continuum of childbearing – as natural as birth itself.

Jessica Zucker is a clinical psychologist based in Los Angeles, specializing in women's reproductive and maternal mental health. In 2014, she launched the viral #IHadAMiscarriage campaign with her first New York Times piece, with the aim of de-stigmatizing, de-shaming, and de-silencing the ubiquity of pregnancy loss. Her writing has appeared in The New York Times, The Washington Post, New York Magazine, The Guardian, BuzzFeed, TIME, VICE, Refinery29, Mashable, InStyle, Teen Vogue, PBS, among others. She has been featured on NPR, Good Morning America, Inside Edition, and CNN. She continues to advocate for marginalized communities as well as write and speak publicly about both her experiences in the military and her fight for increased military readiness through equality.
