

Dan Diner was born in 1946. He teaches modern history at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and was the director of the Simon Dubnow Institute for Jewish History and Culture at the University of Leipzig. He is one of the world's most acclaimed international historians.

The Other War is an anatomy of the Second World War, approached from a different perspective: at the centre of events stands Jewish Palestine, situated at the crossroads of European and extra-European colonial perspectives, during the period starting in 1935 with the Abyssinian War, and ending with the battles of El Alamein and Stalingrad in 1942.

The interlacing of two very different conflicts – the Second World War and the fight for Palestine – forms the heart of this dramatic story, and threads itself through the whole book. The result is a densely woven, multi-faceted tapestry of events that links up the European main event of the Second World War with the history of the Middle East.





Frank Sieren is one of Germany's leading experts on China. The journalist, book author and documentary filmmaker has been living in Beijing since 1994 and writes about the developments of the new world power. He was a long-standing contributor to Wirtschaftswoche and Die Zeit and is now a Handelsblatt correspondent. He has published several bestselling books on China.

If you want to know what our – and especially our children's – lives will soon be like, and the kind of technology that will dominate them, take a stroll through Shenzhen: The southern Chinese megacity (population: 12 million) sprang up as if from nowhere, and is now one of the most innovative cities on Earth. Sustainability and a high quality of life are considered standard, but so are facial recognition and the 'transparent human' – in Shenzhen, the cloud knows everything.

The city's techies are outperforming Silicon Valley, their startups are among the most highly valued in the world, and Shenzhen is attracting more and more talented young people from all over the globe who can immerse themselves in an exuberant nocturnal subculture. It is in some ways a model city – yet full of incongruities.



Benjamin von Brackel, born in 1982, graduated from the German School for Journalism in Munich and studied politics in Erlangen and Berlin. Today, he is one of the most renowned environmental journalists in Germany. He works as freelance journalist for the Süddeutsche Zeitung, Die Zeit and Natur focussing on climate change. He cofounded the online magazine klimareporter° and was awarded the German Environmental Media Prize in 2016.

There is something afoot in the world of animals and plants, something which has so far caught too little attention. Wherever they can, animals and plants are moving towards the earth's poles to flee from rising temperatures and drought in their natural habitats. Tropical zones lose their inhabitants, beavers are settling in Alaska, gigantic shoals of fish disappear just to reappear in front of foreign coastlines. Sea creatures move an average of 72 kilometres a year, land creatures an average of 17 kilometres.

In this exciting and vivid book, Benjamin von Brackel describes a phenomenon which demonstrates nature's impressive adaptability as well as the dramatic consequences of climate change – not the least for humankind, for the migration of species won't leave us unaffected.

Sooner or later, death takes us all: you, me, that plant on the office windowsill. When death enters our lives, it conjures up emotions such as anger and helplessness, we are in pain, feel unfairly treated and are in shock – and it just hurts so much. In this book, we'll take the edge off this big and serious subject, and find out what life is and why death exists (and has to exist) at all. We observe the small-scale dying that happens in our bodies every day, and then look outwards: we meet an immortal jellyfish deep underwater, and collect pine cones from ancient mountain trees. One year in the eternal ice – a milestone in climate research

On the 20th September 2019 began the largest polar expedition of all time: The research vessel RV Polarstern set off from the port of Tromsø, Norway, to be frozen to the ice of the North Pole. Scientists from 20 countries have boarded to research the consequences of climate change for one whole year.
