



Censorship led Nandita Dinesh to fiction; Nandita's non-fiction work surrounding Kashmir led to encounters with the police, bans on social media, and quasi house-arrest, and so she had to find another way to write about a conflict that has consumed her imagination for over a decade and that continues to devour the lives of many. Set during a wedding-under-curfew, *This Place* | *That Place* centers on two characters who come from opposing sides of an unnamed war. One character finds his calling in the fictional realm of "Protest Design," with a focus on making protests more salient and effective, while the other character develops and executes a "Deprogramming Curriculum" aimed at That Place's armed forces, with the hope that soldiers from That Place can begin to question their unwavering nationalism and therefore become less prone to reactive violence.

Beginning right after the declaration of a curfew and tied to a major shift in the relationship between This Place and That Place, we find these two characters sharing the same isolated space as they grapple with unexplored attraction, their deep and abiding admiration, and a bond they hope to save from being another casualty of this war. Interwoven throughout are documents and correspondence shared between these characters over the years, and so we see their history laid out for us—how they have been reaching toward each other, toward a way to bridge the gap between This Place and That Place (and the conflict within themselves) for so long. Their efforts are earnest, searching, and sublime.

This Place | That Place offers a new way to talk about conflict and two-sidedness, a new way to think about writing, and a new way for form and content to speak to one another.



Sadie Green and Sam Masur met as kids playing video games at a hospital—Sadie there to support her ill sister and Sam there after a car accident that will cause him lifelong chronic pain. But they had a falling out and didn't speak for years. As the novel opens, Sadie is a student at MIT and Sam is at Harvard when they spot one another in a subway station and their lost friendship is instantly reignited. What transpires is an epic modern love story that follows two great minds, along with Sam's charming roommate Marx, on a journey of artistic collaboration designing video games as they careen into adulthood. 

The Sign For Home tells the story of Arlo Dilly, a DeafBlind 23-year-old man raised by conservative family members who limit his use of technology. While taking a basic English composition class, Arlo is assigned a new sign language interpreter named Cyril Brewster who is recovering from a romantic breakup and is looking for a new challenge in his career. When Cyril begins to interpret Arlo's classes he soon realizes that Arlo's understanding of language, love, and life have been limited, governed, and often censored by iron-fisted guardians. Showing Arlo more of the world and the independence he could have puts Cyril in conflict with Arlo's family.

Against this external conflict of language mediation, we travel inside Arlo's mind and inside his perceptions of the most important moments of his life, including his own linguistic awakenings, and a heartbreaking memory of first love and first friendship derailed by unspeakable tragedy. When the buried memories are eventually unlocked by a class writing assignment, Arlo convinces Cyril to abandon his own professional ethics to facilitate a forbidden meeting with his old school friends and first love.

The narration of *The Sign For Home* alternates between Arlo's voice (with its distinctive Deaf syntax) and Cyril's fast and funny point of view, with dialogue rendered in both standard English and an approximation of American Sign Language structure. The resulting novel is not only unique, but fast-paced, delectable, emotional, and powerful.

In the title story, half a dozen people move into an experimental biodome for a shot at a million dollars, if they can survive two years. And in "Sun City," published in The New Yorker, a young woman meets her grandmother's roommate in the wake of her death and attempts to solve the mystery of whether the two women were lovers.

As the *Boston Globe* noted of her first collection, Horrocks is a master of "wild yet delicately handled satire," a "sprightly heartbreak" in which she is able to "mingle a note of tenderness in the desolation." With its startling range—from Norwegian trolls to Peruvian tour guides—*Life Among the Terranauts* once again dazzles readers, cementing Horrocks's reputation as one of the premier young writers of our time.



Lynne Sharon Schwartz's characters are indefatigable New Yorkers whose longestablished routines are thwarted by a swerve of fate or a mishap or a time warp. A man generously lends his car to his ex-wife and is bewildered when she neglects to return it and keeps making implausible excuses not to bring it back. A neat and orderly clothing store owner is taken in and manipulated by an ailing elderly neighbor who then leaves her all earthly possessions. A woman who has been left by her husband for a younger woman and forced to visit the couple in order to see her children realizes with a mixture of fascination and elation that her former husband has been physically and psychologically debilitated by his recent marriage to a much younger wife. The majority of Schwartz's characters reflect her many decades of accumulating wisdom and her sharp and fascinating perspective. Reflecting on the past, one of her characters muses, "Memory is so prone to digression." To sustain a logical or chronological sequence we must keep dragging our minds off their natural course like a cowboy tugging on a calf with a rope around its "neck who wants to run off into the fields". 




David Gordon

Just months after moving into the White House under the worst of circumstances—following the assassination of President John F. Kennedy—he had to decide whether to run to win the presidency in his own right. He turned to his most reliable, trusted political strategist: his wife, Lady Bird Johnson.

Where no presidential biographer has understood the full impact of Lady Bird Johnson's work in the White House, Julia Sweig is the first to draw substantially on Lady Bird's own voice in her White House diaries to place Claudia Alta "Lady Bird" Johnson center stage and to reveal a woman ahead of her time—and an accomplished politician in her own right.







It follows its influence into the home, within industry, contemporary art and aesthetics, and national identity, asking all the while to consider the political impact of our everyday choices. But the story begins in the halls of Wendy's son's elementary school, which was recently treated to a new coat of paint. And it is that revulsion that leads her to this encompassing examination, this ingeniously supported and timely argument against the white paint that surrounds us all.





Giving is a form of participation. Philanthropy by the rest of us—across geographies and cultural traditions—begins with and builds on active commitment to our communities.


