ONE LAST SHOT

ONE LAST SHOT is a YA historical novel in verse based on the true story of Gerda Taro, the first female photojournalist killed in combat.

Gerta Pohorylle is an outsider. A daughter of Polish Jewish immigrants among German gentiles, she knows she doesn't quite fit in. While she's away at boarding school, however, she becomes a master at reinventing herself, showing people what they want to see with a bit of lipstick and a wink. Gerda slips into the persona of Poho—a fun cosmopolitan girl who determines her own future.

However, Gerda's old life doesn't quite fit when she returns from school, and she gets more involved with left-wing groups as Germany splits into political extremes. She's arrested in 1933, after the appointment of Chancellor Hitler, for distributing anti-Nazi propaganda. After her release, Gerta and her family decide she must leave Germany. She goes to Paris, armed with her Poho chameleon instincts and fluency in several languages.


When Gerda meets André Friedman, a Hungarian photographer looking for fame and fortune, they immediately click. She becomes more interested in photography herself, how it can frame reality and capture a fleeting moment forever. Together they invent Robert Capa, a rich American photographer they "assist," and soon they're selling "Capa's" work for high prices and to great acclaim. Friedman takes over Capa's identity, and Gerda takes the last name Taro for herself as she takes on more photography assignments. Her sharp eye serves her well as the unstoppable pair sets off to Spain to cover the growing conflict that becomes the Spanish Civil War. As Gerda pushes closer and closer to the front line, she risks her life to show the hopeful side of the republic torn apart by the deadly fascist insurrection.

ONE LAST SHOT is a young woman's story of truth, perspective, and passion for a cause she considers greater than herself during a political time highly relevant to our own.

Fin learns the treasure hunt traces back to his great-grandpapa, a true family legacy. Cooler yet, the old Spanish gold they seek was brought in from Cuba, his heritage country. With debris scattered everywhere, there's no worse time to continue exploring, but Fin convinces Abuelo to go on the mission. Their outing takes a near-deadly turn when Abuelo has a stroke and Fin's left to figure things out on his own, navigating to shore where a helicopter airlifts Abuelo.

Abuelo survives, but weak and unable to speak, his prognosis is bleak. Fin decides to let Dad in on the secret in order to resume the treasure hunt. Finding the gold might be the only way to save Abuelo's life; give him hope.

But danger lurks at every turn. Fin's forced to deal with Sly, the dive pro Dad hires to ensure safety and a babysitter he's convinced is out to steal their treasure. Following a series of fruitless dives dad decides he's done chasing ghosts and catering to Abuelo's fantasy. But Abuelo is losing the will to live, and Fin is in a race against time to locate the treasure before Abuelo gives up.

That night Fin has a nightmare. In it, his Great-grandpapa shows him a treasure map, but dad's not buying into a silly dream, and Fin's must save Abuelo and find the treasure on his own. Dad busts Fin's secret mission but agrees to take him out one last time. Fin locates the treasure, but greed stalks at his side after the loot gets lugged aboard. The babysitter threatens them with a speargun, prompting Dad to show uncharacteristic bravery, but his show of strength gets him wounded, leaving Fin to save them.

Once the treasure is secured, they discover it belonged to a man named Pickerberry. Unfortunately, Pickerberry's ghost wants it back. Rejuvenated with the news of the recovered treasure, Abuelo decides to return the gold to its rightful owners: Pickerberry's grandchildren, to rescue their ocean studies camp in the Keys that was destroyed by the hurricane. After all, the real treasure was the adventure, the hunt and the discovery of family bonds.

Sallie Anne Rodriguez has published articles in Latina Style and local Miami lifestyle magazines, including Wave, Key Biscayne, and International Yachtsman. It's 1941 and ten-year-old Norman Mineta is a carefree fourth grader in San Jose, California, who loves baseball, hot dogs, and Cub Scouts. But when Japanese forces attack Pearl Harbor, Norm's world is turned upside down.

One by one, things that he and his Japanese American family took for granted are taken away. In a matter of months they, along with everyone else of Japanese ancestry living on the West Coast, are forced by the government to move to internment camps, leaving everything they have known behind.

At the Heart Mountain internment camp in Wyoming, Norm and his family live in one room in a tar paper barracks with no running water. There are lines for the communal bathroom, lines for the mess hall, and they live behind barbed wire and under the scrutiny of armed guards in watchtowers.

Meticulously researched and informed by extensive interviews with Mineta himself, Enemy Child sheds light on a little-known subject of American history. Andrea Warren covers the history of early Asian immigration to the United States and provides historical context on the U.S. government's decision to imprison Japanese Americans alongside a deeply personal account of the sobering effects of that policy.

Warren takes readers from sunny California to an isolated wartime prison camp and finally to the halls of Congress to tell the true story of a boy who rose from "enemy child" to a distinguished American statesman. Mineta was the first Asian mayor of a major city (San Jose) and was elected ten times to serve in the U.S. House of Representatives, where he worked tirelessly to pass legislation, including the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. He also served as Secretary of Commerce and Secretary of Transportation. He has had requests by other authors to write his biography, but this is the first time he has said yes because he wanted young readers to know the story of America's internment camps.

Norman Mineta was a ten-time Congressional representative, who served as Secretary of Commerce and Secretary of Transportation.

A product of meticulous research and extensive interviews with Norman himself, Enemy Child is the first biography written with Mineta's cooperation, and a timely introduction to a lesser-known, troubling moment of American history.

ONE LAST SHOT is a YA historical novel in verse based on the true story of Gerda Taro, the first female photojournalist killed in combat.

Gerta Pohorylle is an outsider. A daughter of Polish Jewish immigrants among German gentiles, she knows she doesn't quite fit in. While she's away at boarding school, however, she becomes a master at reinventing herself, showing people what they want to see with a bit of lipstick and a wink. Gerda slips into the persona of Poho—a fun cosmopolitan girl who determines her own future.

However, Gerda's old life doesn't quite fit when she returns from school, and she gets more involved with left-wing groups as Germany splits into political extremes. She's arrested in 1933, after the appointment of Chancellor Hitler, for distributing anti-Nazi propaganda. After her release, Gerta and her family decide she must leave Germany. She goes to Paris, armed with her Poho chameleon instincts and fluency in several languages.


When Gerda meets André Friedman, a Hungarian photographer looking for fame and fortune, they immediately click. She becomes more interested in photography herself, how it can frame reality and capture a fleeting moment forever. Together they invent Robert Capa, a rich American photographer they "assist," and soon they're selling "Capa's" work for high prices and to great acclaim. Friedman takes over Capa's identity, and Gerda takes the last name Taro for herself as she takes on more photography assignments. Her sharp eye serves her well as the unstoppable pair sets off to Spain to cover the growing conflict that becomes the Spanish Civil War. As Gerda pushes closer and closer to the front line, she risks her life to show the hopeful side of the republic torn apart by the deadly fascist insurrection.

ONE LAST SHOT is a young woman's story of truth, perspective, and passion for a cause she considers greater than herself during a political time highly relevant to our own.

Kip Wilson is the author of White Rose, a critically-acclaimed YA novel-inverse about anti-Nazi political activist Sophie Scholl. Kip holds a Ph.D. in German Literature and was the Poetry Editor at Young Adult Review Network (YARN) for five years before joining Voyage as Associate Editor in 2020. To avoid considering that possibility, Francie plunges into her senior year at a small-town high school near Enchantment Lake in northern Minnesota. It's a radical change from her private school in New York, but she hopes to keep an eye on her great aunts and maybe finally learn more about the mother she never knew. A small silver box seems to hold the answers, and she is determined to get her hands on it.

But when her long-lost brother turns up, so does a dead body, and once again Francie is drawn into a mystery. A long list of suspects, with Theo at the top, keeps her head spinning. When Francie herself becomes a suspect she starts to feel like she is walking on thin ice, but it isn't until she is literally walking on thin ice that the pieces start to come together—and by then it may be too late.

In her previous adventure *Enchantment Lake*, Francie was thrown into northern Minnesota lake living: fishing, berry picking, lost kayaks and scary boat rides, poisoned hotdishes, exploding bulldozers, a forest fire . . . and murder. But if she thinks things have settled down, she's in for a surprise. A new school with new friends (and a few enemies), a lead role in a play, an encounter with a giant muskie, archaeological twists, secret tunnels, thin ice, and a strangely sticky murder are all coming her way in *The Clue in the Trees*.

This how-to guide provides projects for children and teens interested in awakening their creativity and learning carving and woodworking skills.
