Film & TV

BUILD YOUR HOUSE AROUND MY BODY: Following a competitive series of conversations, Violet Kupersmith has chosen the Belletrist production team—actress Emma Roberts and her producing partner Karah Preiss—as partners for the development of a scripted TV series. Vietnamese screenwriter Oanh Ly (*Criminal Minds, The Chilling Adventures of Sabrina*) is also attached to adapt the pilot episode and as showrunner for the series.

BROOD: envisioned as a feature film with the same tonal integrity and interior elegance as Polzin's prose, BROOD is now in development at Topic Studios (*Spotlight, Spencer*) with Mollye Asher (*Nomadland*) attached to produce, and Haley Bennet (*Hillbilly Elegy*) attached to play the lead.

PERESTROIKA IN PARIS: Jane Smiley's charming fable for adult readers is in <u>active</u> <u>development</u> as an animated feature film with producer Frank Marshall (*Jurassic Park, Bourne Identity*) and Director Barry Sonnenfeld (*Men in Black, Addams Family*) who have set up the project at a major studio (details to be shared in an additional press release).

FALLOUT: Lesley Blume's impeccably reported, fast-paced account of the reporter who scooped the world in the wake of Hiroshima's atrocities has been in active development with Ink Factory (*The Night Manager*) and Endeavor Content, and screenwriter Ken Kobayashi (who wrote the upcoming Marvel series *Hit Monkey*) has just been officially hired to adapt. Their next step will be securing a Director. Meanwhile, documentary development also continues, with Blume herself actively involved.

FORTY ACRES: Dwayne Alexander Smith's bone-chilling, racially charged thriller of 2014 is now in development at Netflix as a feature film. *Luke Cage* creator Cheo Hodari Coker is attached to adapt the screenplay, while rapper and mogul Jay-Z will produce, along with James Lassiter and Kapital Entertainment. Deadline has more details on the adaptation in their <u>press release</u>.

WE SHOULD HANG OUT SOMETIME: Josh Sundquist's 2014 bestselling YA memoir, paired with his 2010 memoir for adults JUST DON'T FALL, has been adapted into a TV series at a major streaming network, and is expected to begin filming later this Fall. The series is a heart-warming dramedy for young viewers, about a character based on Sundquist who loses his leg to cancer but decides to conquer middle school and defy all of his perceived limits, and has been greenlit by the network for production. Sold after a 3 day, 13 editor auction in the US, NIGHTCRAWLING is a dazzling, unforgettable novel about a young black woman who walks the streets of Oakland and stumbles headlong into the failure of its justice system—a debut that announces a blazingly original voice.

Kiara and her brother Marcus are barely scraping by in a squalid East Oakland apartment complex optimistically called the Royal-Hi. Both have dropped out of high school, their family fractured by death and prison. But while Marcus clings to his dream of rap stardom, Kiara hunts for work to pay their rent—which has more than doubled—and to keep the nine-year-old boy next door, abandoned by his mother, safe and fed.

One night, what begins as a drunken misunderstanding with a stranger turns into the job Kiara never imagined wanting but now desperately needs: nightcrawling. And her world breaks open even further when her name surfaces in an investigation that exposes her as a key witness in a massive scandal within the Oakland police department.

A debut novel based on the real and unforgettable life of Hannie Schaft, a young woman living in Nazi-occupied Holland who joined the Resistance, learned to shoot, and executed her Nazi targets with such precision that Hitler nicknamed her "the Girl with Red Hair".

Hannie didn't train to be a soldier-- her youthful dream was to finish law school in Amsterdam and join the League of Nations. But Hannie's volunteer work with the Red Cross puts her on the radar of key resistance recruiters, who spot her fearlessness and outrage, recognizing her for the heroine she'll someday become. As the simmering menace of Nazi-occupied Holland reaches a boiling point, Hannie becomes ever more daring, assassinating powerful Nazis point blank, blowing up munitions factories, constantly improvising with last-minute Resistance orders.
